Her dissertation focused on using technology to increase independent responding during vocational tasks, and Michele Mayer, CLO of HMEA, served as one of

her committee members. Her other two committee members were Dr. Tom Zane and Dr. Mary Jane Weiss, both professors in the Ph.D. program at Endicott. Kari's research was conducted at the Darnell School with four students who completed novel vocational tasks using an iPad with a visual schedule app. Kari plans on presenting her dissertation research at the ABA International conference in the spring in San Diego, and hopes to have it published as a journal article in the near future.

Kari has worked at the Darnell School for over 8 years, and enjoys mentoring and training new staff and prospective BCBAs. She looks forward to continuing in her role at Darnell School while also helping Children's Services expand the number of BCBAs, offer more Continuing Education opportunities, and provide consultation as needed.

HMEA's Autism Resource Central's Annual Golf Tournament Fundraiser

Each year we see new participants and golfers who have become friends over the years as they have remained committed to our cause. The weather looked ominous, but the precipitation held off until all players were back in the clubhouse.

A dinner buffet sponsored by BCI and raffle drawing was enjoyed by all. In addition to a day of golf attendees enjoyed that day, they were given vouchers from Cyprian Keyes for another round of golf at the 18 hole course and a round at the 9 hole course at Cyprian.

The Center raised \$15,000.00 that will go towards furthering the mission of the center which is to provide autism services and supports for children, adults and their families in central Massachusetts. Over 3,400 families are registered with the Center, which is also celebrating its 20th Anniversary Year.



MassHealth Restructuring

In August, the Baker Administration announced that 17 health care organizations across the state have agreed to participate in a major restructuring of MassHealth. Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs), will be financially accountable for cost, quality, and member experience for over 850,000 MassHealth members. Member enrollment in ACOs will be based upon their relationship with their current primary care provider to ensure continuity of care. All ACO models support MassHealth's commitment to invest in community based organizations, referred to as Certified Community Partners for behavioral health and long term services and supports.

"The ACO program represents a significant change in the way we contract and partner with providers," said Dan Tsai, Assistant Secretary and Director of the MassHealth program. "Historically, MassHealth has operated under a fee-for-service model that leads to gaps in care and inefficiencies. Under this new model, MassHealth will be partnering with provider organizations directly to deliver coordinated, quality care to members." (quoted from the Massachusetts Health and Human Services website)

In response to this new model of care coordination, HMEA has joined Seven Hills Foundation, Advocates, Boston Center for Independent Living, BayPath Elder Services and Brockton Area Multi-Services (BAMSI) to form a collaborative entity called, Massachusetts Care Coordination Network (MCCN). In May, MCCN bid on the Certified Community Partner Request for Response and was awarded a contract, which will begin in April 2018. HMEA's role in the MCCN will be to provide Autism Services in the Central Massachusetts area. This is a natural fit for our agency since we have been working toward becoming the lead agency for Autism Services and Resources through our Central Massachusetts Autism Summit, our Students for Higher® program and our Autism in the Workforce employment initiatives.

C4C - HMEA's Technology Frontier – Helping other nonprofits with their IT platforms

Since 2012, HMEA has been the fortunate recipient of generous donations from both EMC (now DELL) and Cisco of advanced technology equipment. The capacity was so great that after attending many conferences, and hearing from other non-profits that they indeed needed help with their own IT needs, the idea of starting our own company was born in 2015, to help other non-profits.

Cloud for Causes (C4C) is an Information Technology company that provides computer support and services to other non-profits and does so via HMEA's existing IT staff. The goal is to provide *"The Best Technology at prices you can afford!"*.

As an IT company, C4C continues to grow by providing cloud services, help desk services, technical support, content management support, social media support and more to Massachusetts and Rhode Island based non-profits. C4C also electronically hosts a version of our Consumer Information Database (CID), for 28 other agencies and helps champion a consortium of users to suggest enhancements to the system. Our unique position as a non-profit allows us to "speak the language" of other non-profits. We personally know the challenges and opportunities that non-profits face and we are in a position to help guide them to success. C4C currently supports some 4,000 devices on our network across the United States.

This year, C4C will surpass the 1 million dollar mark in total revenue since its inception! The money earned goes back to HMEA's support programs. C4C helps other non-profits fulfill their own mission without having to worry about their IT needs.

Habitat for Humanity Update

During the heat of the summer, volunteers from Dell Manufacturing in Franklin joined HMEA staff to help build a brand-new handicap accessible home for a family supported by HMEA.

Family Supports Coordinator, **Pat Lynch**, was instrumental in encouraging and assisting the family with applying for a new home through Habitat for Humanity. In fact, Pat recently won an Advocacy Award at HMEA's 28th Annual Awards night for her outstanding advocacy for them and other families she works with.



The new home (pictured above) will meet the needs of the couples nine children, four of which have mobility challenges. According to Habitat for Humanity, the project is moving along quickly thanks to the many volunteers who have helped with the build and they expect that the family will be able to move into their new home in November.
